  - (i) the area of the region bounded by the half-lines  $\theta = \frac{1}{6}\pi$ ,  $\theta = \frac{1}{2}\pi$  and *C*, [2]
  - (ii) the length of C. [3]

2 The cubic equation  $x^3 - px - q = 0$ , where *p* and *q* are constants, has roots  $\alpha$ ,  $\beta$ ,  $\gamma$ . Show that

- (i)  $\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2 = 2p$ , [1]
- (ii)  $\alpha^3 + \beta^3 + \gamma^3 = 3q$ , [2]

(iii) 
$$6(\alpha^5 + \beta^5 + \gamma^5) = 5(\alpha^3 + \beta^3 + \gamma^3)(\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2).$$

Write down the values of  $S_1$ ,  $S_2$ ,  $S_3$ ,  $S_4$ . Express  $u_r$  in terms of r, justifying your answer. [4]

## EITHER

State the fifth roots of unity in the form  $\cos \theta + i \sin \theta$ , where  $-\pi < \theta \le \pi$ . [2]
