You are required to produce a short piece of drama on each stimulus in preparation for your written examination. Questions will be asked on **each** of the stimuli and will cover both practical and theoretical issues.

**EXTRACT****Taken from *Amadeus* by Peter Shaffer**

These notes are intended to help you understand the context of the drama.

Peter Shaffer's play *Amadeus* was first performed in 1979 at the Royal National Theatre in London, directed by Sir Peter Hall. Although it has since been made into a film, you should focus your study on this printed extract from the play rather than any awareness you may have of the film version, which contains a significant number of differences.

The play explores the relationship between successful court composer Antonio Salieri and the immature and vulgar Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, and presents the possibility that Salieri murdered Mozart. Although the two men are of similar age (Salieri was born in 1750, Mozart in 1756) their behaviour, attitudes, and manners – not to mention their respective musical abilities – are very different.

The action of the play takes place in Vienna in November 1823, and, in flashback, the decade 1781–1791. The extract consists of the whole of Act One.
