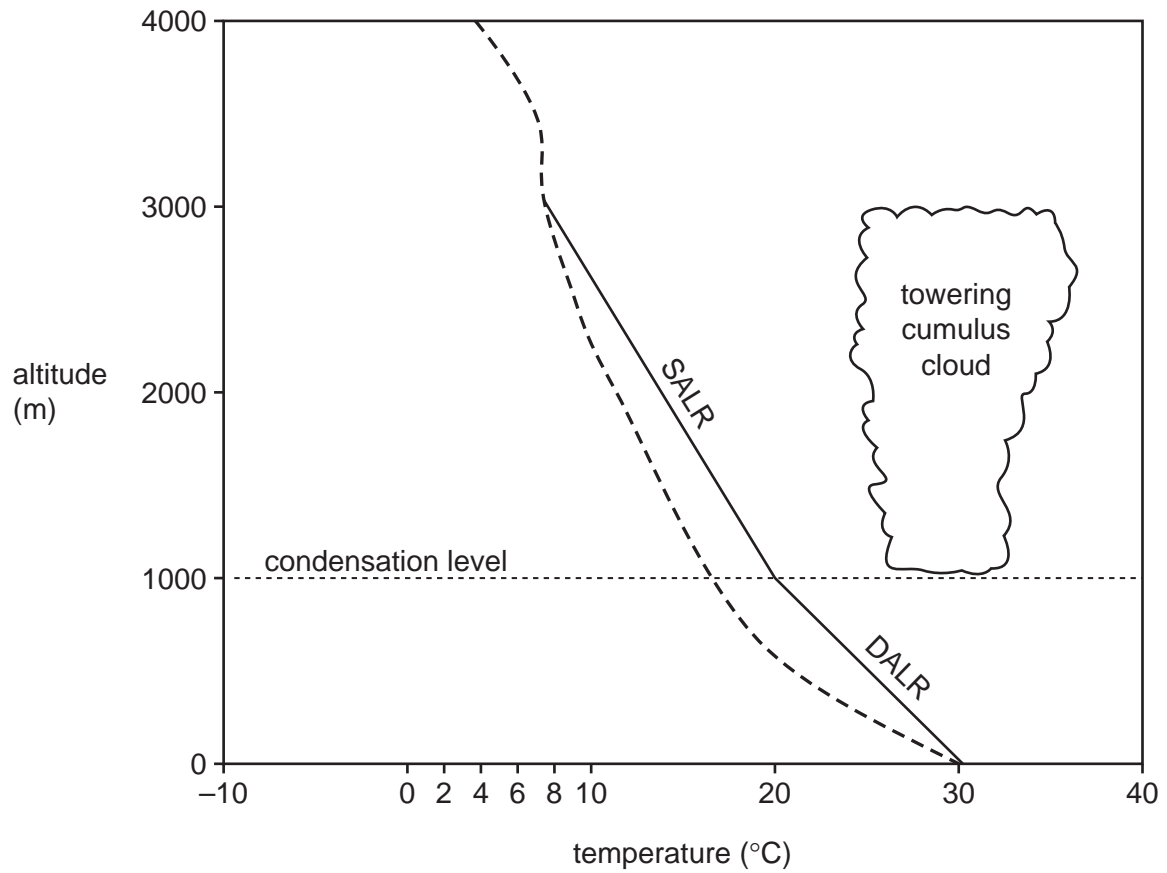

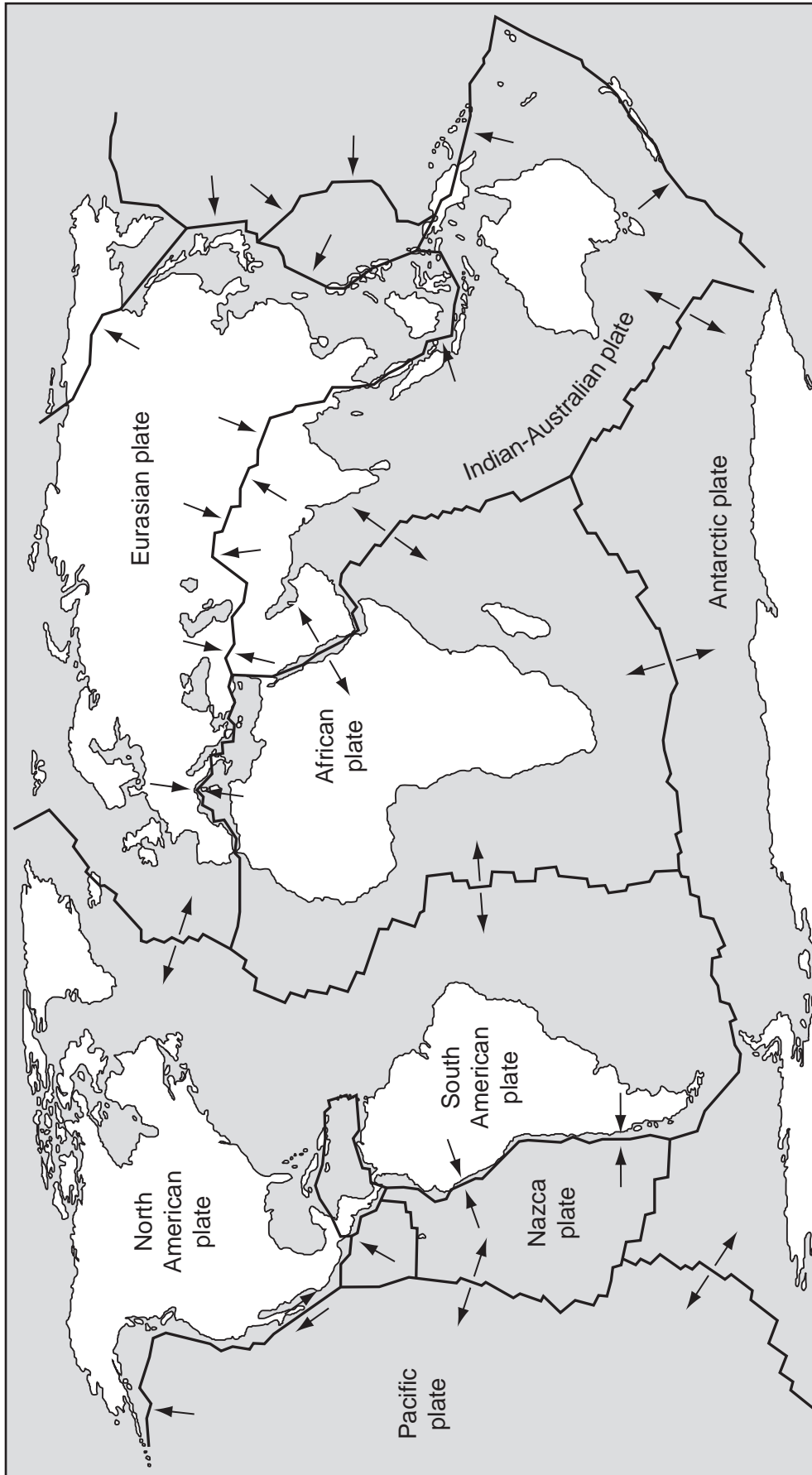
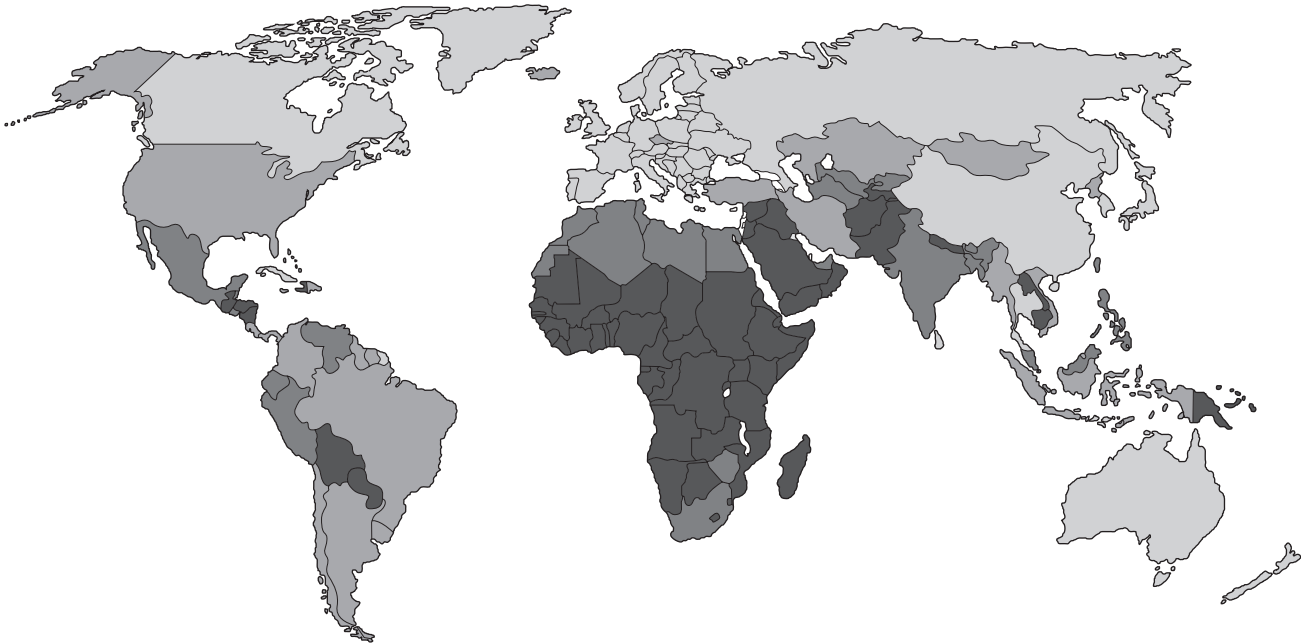

Total fertility rate by country, 2000






Age/sex pyramids for three districts of San Diego, USA

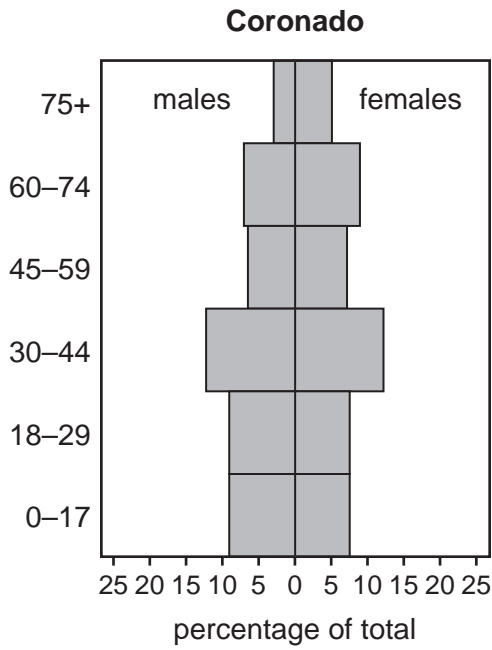

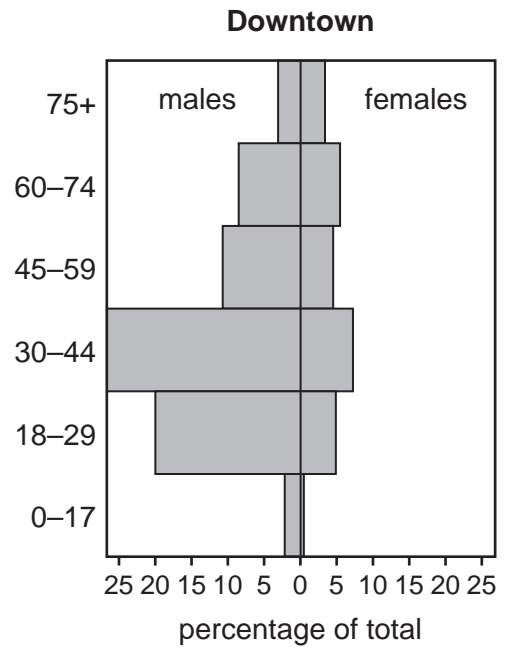

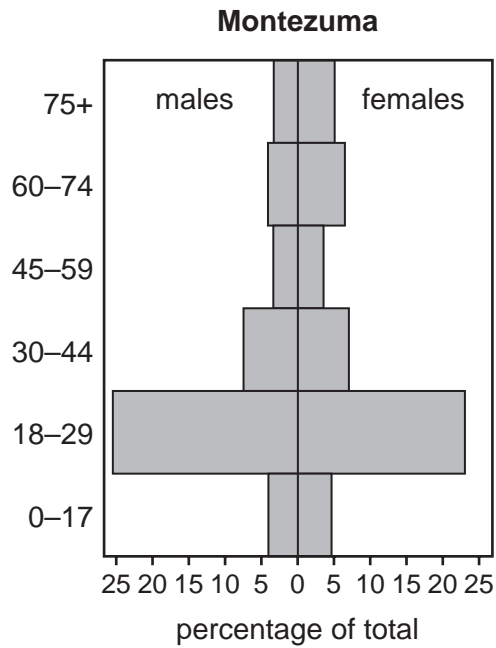


Fig. 4C

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
