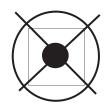

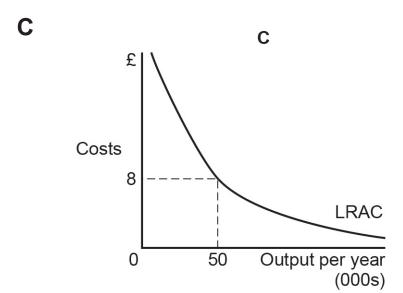
The following diagrams show four possible long run average cost curves (LRAC) for a firm operating in a market where the annual sales are 400 000 units per year.
